Meet Kate, a two-time UCDVO volunteer and an active member of the UCDVO Student Society.

Kate's interest in international development and her inherent curiosity in societal inequalities, coupled with a desire to find a community and make friends, led her to UCDVO.

The critical-thinking skills she cultivated during her time with UCDVO were integral in the next steps on her journey, as Kate went on to complete a Master's in Public Policy and Human Development at the Maastricht School of Governance and begin a PhD at the International School of Social Studies, focusing on how donors influence social policy systems in low and middle-income countries. the non-take-up of social protection for the United Nations Special Rapporteur.

Kate highlighted the complexity of overseas volunteering and said she continues to grapple with the intricacies of international development.
